- healthy meals for at-risk schoolchildren
- mentors for children with an incarcerated parent
- afterschool enrichment for underserved students
- coaches to guide court-involved youth

Volunteers of America has a long commitment to serving children in need. For example, healthy meals for students are served up by our Fresh Food Factor initiative. This school year, Fresh Food Factor will supply 1.4 million nutritious breakfasts, lunches, snacks and suppers at local partner education sites. Designed to offer a healthy alternative to processed school lunches, Fresh Food Factor aims to reduce childhood obesity and boost school performance.

This strong commitment also extends to our other children's programs. Youth with a parent in prison

have a 70 percent chance of going to jail themselves—unless intervention occurs. Our Mentoring Children of Promise program is that intervention for hundreds of youth who benefit from extra guidance and attention from caring adults. The Lighthouse program gives

at-risk youth a safe place to learn and develop after school hours. And, the Positive Pathways Program steers young offenders from high-crime neighborhoods to better lives. For more details about our children's programs, visit voagno.org.

Opening Doors To Affordable Housing In Terrebonne

The Houma community celebrated the Nov. 5 opening of Volunteers of America’s latest workforce housing initiative, Bayou Cane Apartments in Terrebonne Parish.

Bayou Cane brings 82 beautiful, newly constructed one- and two-bedroom apartments to the Houma area, which has a great need for safe, affordable housing for employees of key service industries. “We feel privileged to offer these homes to families as part of our commitment to affordable housing for working people,” said Jim

LeBlanc, Volunteers of America President/CEO. Eighty-five percent of the apartments have been leased.

A portion of Bayou Cane Apartments are reserved for employed persons and families earning up to 80 percent of area median income. The four-acre landscaped site features two- and three-story garden-style buildings, playground, community center, dog park, parking and nature trail. Fifteen of the apartments can serve persons with disabilities and are ideal for older tenants who want to stay in their homes as they age.



Terrebonne Parish President Michel Claudet said, “Volunteers of America has a reputation of doing excellent work and being active members of the communities they serve.” Our organization will stay active at Bayou Cane by offering residents an array of supportive services.

Volunteers of America’s commitment to the area will continue. In January, Renaissance Neighborhood Development Corporation, a subsidiary of Volunteers of America, will break ground on new senior apartment homes at the former Houma Elementary School. In partnership with Terrebonne Parish Consolidated Government and Terrebonne Council on Aging, this development will offer 103 one- and two-bedroom apartments for active, independent seniors age 62 and over. It is expected to open in spring 2017.

An unplanned pregnancy can be confusing and overwhelming.

Volunteers of America has been helping women in this situation since 1942. Our expert staff helps women access medical care and offers confidential counseling. We help expectant mothers understand pregnancy options and make the best choices for their babies. From initial consultation through follow-up support, our staff is a constant resource.

Over the decades, Volunteers of America has created literally thousands of loving families through adoption. As a licensed adoption agency, we work with birth parents and adoptive parents through all aspects of adoption.

During November, National Adoption Awareness Month, we celebrate our Adoption and Maternity program as a respected pioneer of openness in adoption. With openness, birth parents choose the adoptive couple who will raise their child and have the opportunity to meet the couple before the birth. The level of openness varies with each

adoption, based on the wishes of the birth parents and adoptive parents. This approach allows all parties involved to share information and work together to ensure a healthy, positive future for the baby. It eases natural anxieties and fears of the unknown that birth parents, adoptive parents and, eventually, the child may face.

This legacy program depends on support from caring friends such as you to ensure that our mission of creating loving adoptive families continues. Adoption and Maternity needs to fill an anticipated \$140,000 shortfall in funding this fiscal year.

There are many meaningful ways to support Adoption and Maternity. In addition to financial gifts, we seek sponsors and volunteers for our annual GolfStar Classic. Sylvia understands that feeling now herself. She is humbled and grateful that Heath's birth parents entrusted her and her husband to be his parents.

St. Tammany Senior Credits Crisis Response Program With Life-Saving Care

Old habits are hard to break. No one knows this better than retired St. Tammany residents Lou and Betty, married 60 years.

Outwardly, Lou, 82, was known as a good friend, popular and active in his community. But inwardly, a problem haunted him for most of his marriage. Often and without warning, he flew into extreme fits of verbal rage at his wife. Lou always felt ashamed and frustrated after an outburst. Betty felt hurt, helpless and alone. Lou says he always sincerely loved Betty, but she felt the brunt of his anger. Their friends had no idea.

Over the years, Lou tried getting help through religion or therapists, but nothing worked. It took a call to Volunteers of America's Crisis Response Program for him to finally discover ways to control his rage.

Following an outburst, Lou was in desperation. He recalls thinking, "If I die tomorrow, all Betty is going to remember is my anger." He saw a newspaper article about our Crisis Response Program. Broken and distraught, he tried one more time to reach out for help.

He talked to Suzanne, a licensed social worker with the program, who listened carefully. Suzanne persistently reached out to help the couple, discussing coping skills and encouraging Lou to attend a 12-step program for those with similar challenges. She found him transportation to the meetings.

Slowly, Lou learned ways to prevent his escalating anger. He admitted his struggles to others in the program and took responsibility for his actions. And, he discovered the painful truth that he had

long suffered from untreated PTSD since his Korean War combat service.

Lou sincerely apologized to Betty for the pain he had caused over the years. Gradually—with the commitment of Suzanne, now a close friend, and group support—Lou's anger issues have begun to dissolve. Betty says Lou is truly a changed man. "Life is so much better now."

The Crisis Response Program helps many in St. Tammany cope with behavioral health problems. The goal always is to intervene before a crisis escalates. Our staff is committed to offering hope and real-life solutions. As Lou's experience shows, it's never too late, or too early, to ask for help.
